April 10, 1959 - February 6, 2019

MARCY - Mr. William V. "Bill" Robertello, Sr., age 59, passed away courageously, with peace in his heart, on Wednesday, February 6, 2019 at Strong Memorial Hospital with his loving family by his side.

Born in Utica on April 10, 1959, William was the son of Joyce (Shields) Robertello and the late Frank J. Robertello. He was a graduate of Notre Dame High School/Class of 1977 and went on to MVCC where he received a degree in Heating and Air Conditioning. On August 25, 1984 he married the former Gina Manca with whom he shared 34 happy years. They were devoted to one another, and he encouraged Gina to see life from many perspectives. He always respected her decisions and he was a good husband. Theirs was a wonderful life, but it fell short of the years they had hoped for.

Bill began his career at MetLife Insurance in an introductory position, and he worked his way up to Facilities Manager overseeing their multiple locations. Due to ill health, he retired after 20 years of service. He was appreciated by his co-workers and he had a great appreciation for his profession.

Bill lived a humble life, and worldly possessions were second to the love of his family. Blessed with a positive life force, he had a smile on his face and encouraged his children to be optimistic. He was a great role model, teaching them to remain calm and in control in any possible situation. He coached not only his kids, but many others as well, in hockey and other sporting events. He lived the epitome of God's words; he was generous, thoughtful, and approachable. He held no grudges and had no regrets. He knew that life is too short, and he stood strong to the end. Bill had fortitude and he found the strength to take himself to dialysis even though it was difficult due to his physical limitations. He remained independent when he set out to achieve his goals. He also had an impressive amount of knowledge and know-how which he passed on to his family.

When it came to sports, it was New York all the way: Rangers hockey, Giants football, Yankees baseball. He had a really good rapport with people and he loved to talk. Country music was the key to his solace, and during his 13-year illness he was never 'down'. He lived each and every day as if it were his last. His cuddly canine companions, Mia, Harley, and Ella, followed him all day long and kept him company. He texted his wife and children with words of encouragement and love each day. Through the years, he left love notes to

his wife, even after four children, expressing his abiding love for her and the joy of their life together. He was so proud of his four incredible children and was never disappointed with any of their decisions. He often teased them so they would develop a tough skin, and not take words too seriously. Bill was never offended or took things to heart. He would lean back and laugh after others tried to get his goat. He rarely became embarrassed, and he was an open book. His legacy lies in the pages of that book, ...in stories of love, kindness, and courage.

Bill is survived by his wife, Gina; his children and their loved ones, Amanda M. Robertello and RJ Girard, Matthew D. Robertello UFD and his wife Kristi Robertello, William V. Robertello Jr., and Ariana N. Robertello and Gary Casab; the joy of his life, his granddaughter, Giada Rose and he was looking forward to the birth of his first grandson in May, Nathan Michael; his mother, Joyce; sister and brother-in-law, Julie and John Rundle; brothers and sisters-in-law, Frank and Judith Robertello, and Daniel J. and Diane Robertello. He also leaves his nieces, nephews, great-nieces, great-nephews, cousins, aunts, uncles, in-laws, Richard D. and Eve Manca; and the many good friends who filled his life. He was predeceased by his beloved in-laws who he respected, Dominick A. "Dick" and Nicolena (Mosca) Manca.

The family is grateful to the physicians, caregivers, and wonderful people who assisted Bill and his family at Strong Memorial Hospital and their staffs in the ICU and the Medical/Surgical Unit who gave so personally of themselves with courtesy and kindness, and they will not be forgotten.

Visitation will be held Sunday from 2:00-5:00 at the Eannace Funeral Home, Inc., 932 South St., corner of Hammond Ave. Bill's funeral service and Celebration of Life will commence on Monday morning at 10:00 from the funeral home and at 11:00 at St. Mary of Mt.
