Mr. Jerome A. Cianciolo, age 75, passed away on Friday, October 10, 2014 at Tampa General Hospital in Florida.

Born in Utica on January 13, 1939, Jerome was the son of the late Thomas J., Sr. and Mary L. (DeJoseph) Cianciolo. Raised and educated locally, he was a graduate of Utica Free Academy and Syracuse University.

For several years, Jerome worked for the National Auto Company and later formed and co-owned Northwood Studios where he worked with Rodney Fleming as a Tin Smith and Artist. Jerome and Rodney traveled to many shows to see their masterful creations on display. Jerome's artwork was also exhibited at the Munson-Williams-Proctor Arts Institute. While residing in Florida, Jerome garnered great joy in volunteering to teach Art to children affected by autism. A portrait of Jerome would portray him with a smile and a snicker, a supportive and fun-loving person who always put people at ease by making them laugh and providing unconventional wit and unconditional love. His creative spirit soared when he took in the breathtaking vistas of the high peaks of the Adirondack Mountains.

Jerome is survived by his sister, Veronica "Ronnie" Taylor of Utica; his brothers and sister-in-law, Dr. Thomas J., Jr. and Lori Cianciolo of Clarence, NY, and Joseph D. Cianciolo of New Hartford; his many nieces, nephews, great-nieces, great-nephews, cousins, and his friend, David Hoest. He was predeceased by his brother-in-law, John F. "Jack" Taylor; his sister-in-law, Lee (Cardillo) Cianciolo; and his longtime friend, Rodney Fleming.

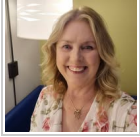
