More than a pizza chef, John became close friends with many customers and like family to his co-workers. Customers would often specifically request that John prepare their pizza pie. He had a way of making people feel welcomed, appreciated, and important.

Through his close friend Bobby, John met Megan Ellis, with whom he shared a 12-year relationship that was blessed with two children, Dominick and Julianna. No matter where life led the pair, they remained the best of friends, and Megan continued to be one of John's most trusted confidants.

John was a devoted father who loved his children more than anything in this world. As an adult child himself, he was the "cool parent" the kids could always turn to when looking for a "yes." He always showed his kids how fun and lighthearted life could be, especially if it meant bending a few rules. He loved coaching them and their friends in various sports, teaching them the importance of winning, as he hated losing. A selfless soul, John was a natural provider, always making sure the kids, as well as all of his family and friends, were taken care of before himself.

Compassionate and free-spirited, John always did what John wanted to do, living life on his own terms. "That's how we do it around here," he would say. He was the life of any party, and what he did not provide in riches, he made up for in laughter, good times, and many lifelong memories. He was an avid sports fan of the Braves, Mavericks, and Cowboys. He was also a talented musician who listened to and played a variety of genres. He played bass guitar in several bands and performed at Uptown and various local venues. It brought John great excitement to introduce others to new music he had discovered, often unlike anything they had heard before.

John was very active, beginning in his early years skateboarding from place to place throughout the city. He was also part of the FTA's, an adult softball team that once won an award against a team of teenagers. He enjoyed adventures to Lake George, often rough camping in a tent with nothing more than a Hawaiian shirt and a bucket hat. He was also a proud member of the 240 Club. He had a gift for turning simple moments into unforgettable nights. His humor, goofy personality, and adventurous spirit made every day experiences

memorable. "That's all day, brother."

Family meant everything to John. He would drop anything and everything for those he loved. A true "momma's boy" at heart, his mother was his best friend. He deeply appreciated every sacrifice she made for him and would have given her the world if he could, and if you asked her, she would say that he did.
