



## Robert G. McCorduck

February 28, 1935 - January 25, 2009

Mr. Robert G. McCorduck, age 73, of Deerfield, passed away on Sunday, January 25, 2009 at the Heritage Healthcare Center.

Born in Utica on February 28, 1935, Robert was the son of the late George and Ada (Thomann) McCorduck. Raised and educated in Yorkville, he graduated from Whitesboro High School in 1953 and later attended Utica College. A veteran of the U. S. Army, he served his country as a cryptographer during the Korean Conflict. On March 14, 1959 he married his best friend, the former Patricia Kozlowski, with whom he shared nearly 50 years in a loving and devoted union filled with mutual respect and consideration.

For a number of years Bob was employed by the Jones and Stack Chemical Companies as a chemical salesman. He was a caring, compassionate, and honest man, and he valued his civic affiliations. He was a lifetime member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) Post #7393 New York Mills, and a 27-year member of the American Legion Post #1113 of Whitesboro and the American Legion Post #1376 of New Hartford, serving as Color Guard at both Posts.

Robert is survived by his wife, Pat. Always close to his heart was the memory of his daughter, Karen M. McCorduck, who preceded him in death. He also leaves his son, Kevin McCorduck; and his granddaughter, Jessica, both of Florida. Survivors also include several nieces and nephews, and his in-laws, Audrey and Bob Stonger. He was predeceased by his brothers, George "Bud"

McCorduck, and Don McCorduck.
